Wednesday, February 8, 2023 started a new era in the history of Petawa Cultural Center. On that day at 9 a.m. eight moving trucks showed up at the Astor Street address to transport furniture, accessories and necessities that made the building a home to many for several decades.

Under the expert guidance of Michelle Law, our interior designer extraordinaire, the move was seamless. Furniture was tagged and boxes were color coded and numbered. As the old building cleared out, volunteers got into action cleaning the space and getting it ready for its next occupants.



Promptly at 2 p.m. the trucks rolled into the Brookfield driveway and unloading began. Within a few short hours, the job was done. "I've never seen a more organized move," said one devoted helper, adding, "Michelle's forethought made a complicated move seem easy!"

Those who helped with the move wandered around the new center, exploring the different areas. "I can't wait until all our friends can come here and gather!" was a frequent refrain. Cicada's Cove, the lower level devoted to middle school and high school girls, garnered the most attention. Large, bright rooms for gatherings, a kitchenette and a place to study will be well used year round.

The following week saw dozens of volunteers assembling furniture, hanging pictures and cleaning up construction dust. All the same details that make a house a home were slowly added with a careful eye to those who will be participating at events.

The heart of the center, the beautiful oratory, took considerably longer to complete. Delays with marble and other materials slowed the finish work but the end is in sight! A dedication is set for Thursday, May 11, 2023. At that unique Mass and ceremony, the



new altar will be consecrated by the Archbishop Jerome Listecki. With that final and most important piece in place, Petawa Cultural Center is ready to welcome all. We anticipate that the oratory will be a place of prayer, grace, peace and the seedbed of incredible apostolic initiatives.

Have You Read the Headlines?

"Loneliness and Social Isolation Linked to Serious Health Conditions" and "Loneliness Can Affect Your Mental Health: How to cope". Some might believe loneliness is a new phenomenon, but what's old is new again.

Ancient tradition has long endorsed strong friendships for a full and healthy life. The Book of Wisdom which was generally thought to have been written in the mid first century B.C. advises, "A faithful friend is a sturdy shelter. He

Monsignor Don Mariano Fazio

Earlier this spring, Don Mariano Fazio, the second in command of Opus Dei in the world, visited Milwaukee from Rome. He saw our beautiful new center, and even tried out sitting in the confessional, pronouncing the chair to be very comfortable, which is good, he explained, because our priests should be hearing confessions for many hours! He also gave a class to about 40 women. The main theme of his class was to let us know what is in the heart and mind of Don Fernando Ocariz, the Prelate of Opus Dei. He began by pulling out his phone and reading us a very affectionate text from Don Fernando greeting everyone in Milwaukee.

Don Mariano told us that the first intention of the father, as Don Fernando is known, is that we all pray very much for the Pope and the Church. Other themes included the centrality of Christ, understanding true freedom, and the need to form deep friendships.

In late April there will be an extraordinary Congress held in Rome because some changes need to be made in the statutes of Opus Dei. Fr Mariano explained that, although these changes are necessary in order for Opus Dei to fit into the current ecclesial structure, they will in no way change the essence of Opus Dei, but rather they will help us carry out our mission to be saints in the middle of the world, and he urged us to pray for the Congress.

Don Mariano is himself from Argentina and has known Pope Francis well for many years, and after explaining to us that Argentinians show affection through irony, he entertained us with several humorous anecdotes about his meetings with the Holy Father.

The class ended with a Q&A session in which he fielded many thought-provoking and varied questions, with answers that were profound and that left us with a lot about which to think, pray, and act.

From the Prelate

We had first-hand news in February about the Prelate when Monsignor Mariano Fazio, Auxiliary Vicar of Opus Dei, visited from Rome on a service assignment to all the centers in the Central United States.

Father Mariano had gettogethers with members of Opus Dei in Milwaukee, Chicago, South Bend and Valparaiso, Indiana, St. Louis, Dallas and Houston during his two weeks here and told us the Prelate, Monsignor Fernando Ocariz, is in very good health, very serene and united to the Pope and the Church. His main intention for us is to be sowers of unity, to keep Christ in the center of our lives and to help many others do the same, to live fraternity and friendship and to be understanding with all people, seeing their virtues rather than their defects.

The Prelate wrote an extensive letter to members of the Work on February 16th in which he encouraged us to respond fully to the divine love that God has for each and every one of us 'which our Lord sets before us as the model and goal of our love for others.

"We can't view anyone with indifference," he said, because "each one of us is the result of a thought of God. Each of us is willed, each of us is loved, each of us is necessary."
